## FAGER ENTERS SIXTH SEASON



Russ Fager  
Slippery Rock '71

In terms of post-season appearances, no other Rider sport has had the track record that Russ Fager has put together during his five years as head coach.

Only once under Fager have the Broncos been closed out of tournament or playoff competition. During that span, Rider has appeared in no fewer than three East Coast Conference title games and three consecutive Eastern College Athletic Conference tournaments.

Fager, who is currently Rider's second all-time winningest soccer coach with a 45-35-8 mark, now has his sights set on that all-elusive NCAA tournament bid. "As our caliber of talent improves, our aspirations continue to rise," he says. "If we play up to our capabilities, I have to think we have a very good shot at the NCAA tournament in 1980."

The 31-year-old Trenton resident, who owns a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Rider, spent his undergraduate days at Slippery Rock, where he was a top flight midfielder for three varsity seasons. In his junior and senior years, he was a first team selection to the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Athletic Association's all-star squad.

Before assuming his duties as head coach, he served as Bronc assistant coach from 1971 to 1974. In addition to his soccer duties, Fager is also the director of men's intramurals—a popular program that counts 85-95 percent of the men on campus as participants. He is also an assistant trainer.

Bob Rostron, a former all-conference halfback and lineman for the Broncos, will assist Fager for the second year. A Trenton resident, the former Steinert High stand-out helped lead Rider to a 23-13-3 record under former coach Joe Ritter.

## 1980 SOCCER OUTLOOK

Although the 1980 Broncos may very well be the most talented group of soccer players ever assembled at Rider, they will be very hard-pressed to improve upon their 10-7-2 mark of a year ago.

For starters, no fewer than eight opponents on the 1980 itinerary were involved in post-season play last season. At the top of that list are Philadelphia Textile and Princeton, who finished high in the national rankings and captured NCAA tournament bids.

Nonetheless, a group of 15 lettermen plus a bumper crop of newcomers should put Rider in good stead in its attempt to make a fourth consecutive appearance in ECAC postseason play and a third straight shot at an East Coast Conference title game.

Coach Russ Fager's chief area of concern will be the rebuilding of the front line where graduation losses may have the most telling effect. Steve Schmier, the ECC West's second leading scorer with 10 goals, and Bob Dunn (four) paced the Bronc attack a year ago by combining for more than a third of the total offense. Down the stretch of last season, the Bronc booters were held to one goal or less in eight of 10 contests.

Here is a rundown of the key 1980 personnel:  
**Line:** Senior John Carmignani (five goals) goes to the head of the class, based on his total of 13 career goals in 54 varsity contests. Sophomores Tom Tuffy and Adolf Marisi are also top candidates for starting slots. They are figured to be pushed hard, however, by freshmen Rich Rousseau, Mercer County's (N.J.) leading scorer (25) of 1979, Glenn Brennan and Giuseppe Di Francesco.

**Midfield:** Rider's most experienced position should be the Broncos strong suit again in 1980. Senior co-captains Bruce Brodowski and Jim Palmere have each appeared in 55 straight varsity contests, combining for 25 goals and 15 assists enroute to three straight all-star citations. Junior Jim Canning, a two-year vet, will move up from a fullback position. The return of senior Tony D'Alessandro, who missed last season with a knee injury, figures to give the Broncos marked improvement. Senior Tony Pontieri and sophomore Bill Kirby will also see plenty of action.

**Backfield:** All-ECC selections Ron Bannister and Ruben Rivera are expected back to spearhead the Broncos' fullback slots, although they are being pushed by the ever-improving Peter Kepes. Senior Steve McKenna is back and Ken Tozzi is another newcomer expected to make a key contribution.

**Goaltending:** All-ECC selection Ken Yaros appears to be over the back miseries which cut short his 1979 campaign after 12 games. The 6'0" senior registered five of Rider's six shutouts, tying a team record for whitewashes. Backup help is expected to come from sophomore net-minders Tom Mackin and Louis Wisnowski.

Five games under the lights at nearby Lawrence Township Park highlight an eight-game home schedule. In addition to crosstown rival Trenton State, ECC West opponents West Chester State, Delaware and non-league rivals Loyola (MD) and Rutgers will be hosted at night at Bill Zimmer Field. Textile, Fairleigh Dickinson and La Salle will meet Rider in the facility behind the Stephen A. Maurer Building on the western end of campus.

When Len Nardone took over the reins of the cross country program in 1976, establishing a winning tradition in the sport was virtually unthinkable. The Bronc harriers had suffered through nine consecutive losing campaigns and morale was low.

In 1980, that has all changed. Rider has put together back-to-back winning seasons and with 13 lettermen in the fold, Nardone fully expects his squad to rack up an unprecedented third straight winning log.

Headed by sophomore Tim Anderson, last year's freshman sensation, the Broncs will face a 16-dual meet card this spring, in addition to the Glassboro State Invitational and Paul Short Memorial Run. The schedule is highlighted by the East Coast Conference Championships, which will be held at Philadelphia's Belmont Plateau, Nov. 8.

In addition to Anderson, who holds Rider's best time at home (25:21), other Bronc mainstays should include seniors Jeff Pomeroy, Ed McNeill, and juniors Anthony Cannavina and Joe Veres. All are members of Nardone's "25" Club consisting of Rider harriers who have been clocked in the 25's. Juniors Ken Lehman, last year's "co-trackster of the year," and Dave Melissas are other returnees to watch.

Top newcomers are expected to be freshmen Dave Laurer, Stacey Williams and junior transfer Joe Miterotondo of Suffolk County College (NY). Laurer and Williams have been timed in 1:58 and 1:57 in the 800. Miterotondo has the potential to finish in the 25's.

Nardone, who is also given credit for the resurgence of the track and field program (a best-ever 12-3 mark last spring), will guide the indoor tracksters during their first season of varsity competition this winter.

A member of the Pemberton (NJ) High School faculty for five years prior to coming to Rider, Nardone holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Springfield College.

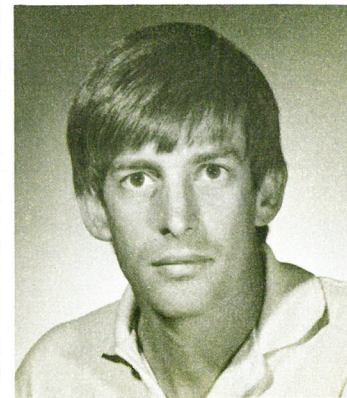

**RIDER SOCCER COACH RUSS FAGER**

Since Rider began East Coast Conference play in 1974, Russ Fager has piloted his soccer contingents into the league championship game on three occasions — more than any other sport on campus. A disappointing 1980 campaign marked only the second time during his six-year career as head coach that the Broncs have failed to qualify for either an ECC or ECAC (Eastern College Athletic Conference) post-season affair.

At age 32, Fager enters his seventh season with a 49-44-11 log, ranking him second to former coach and athletic director Frank Donlon in both departments. Donlon achieved a 74-40-12 record during several intervals between 1933 and 1960.

The Trenton resident has coached three or only five Rider Squads who have won 10 or more games in a season. His 1977 team achieved a new win standard with a 12-5-1 record while the 1975 and 1979 booters chalked up 10-6-1 and 10-7-2 marks, respectively, capped by ECC Western Section titles. Against divisional competition, Fager owns a 17-10-3 record, including a 14-5-1 tally over the last four years.

In the face of one of the East's most impressive schedules, Fager's teams have achieved successive ECAC tournament bids in 1977, 1978 and 1979, reaching the title game in each instance.

The former Slippery Rock State standout came to Rider shortly after a three-year collegiate career as a top-flight midfielder. In his junior and senior years, he was a first team selection to the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Athletic Association all-star squad.

Before assuming his duties as head coach in 1975, he served as Bronc assistant coach from 1971 to 1974. In addition to his soccer duties, Fager has been an athletic trainer and is currently director of men's intramurals — a popular program that counts 85-95 per cent of the men on campus as participants.

**1981 SOCCER PROSPECTUS**

One of coach Russ Fager's most concerted recruitment efforts will be put to the test this fall as the Broncs attempt to rebound from a disappointing 4-9-3 season. Eight starters must be replaced, including six former East Coast Conference all-stars. Eleven letterwinners return, but only two are seniors and the roster counts no fewer than 19 newcomers who will vie for varsity berths.

Goal production, which sagged dramatically during the second half of 1979, plagued the Broncs again in 1980. Rider booters tallied but 20 scores in 16 contests. the lowest total since 1958 when the Roughriders scored 19 while playing a 10-game schedule.

If that's not challenging enough, eight of Rider's opponents this fall were ranked among the top ten teams in the final 1980 ISAA (Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America) Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware Division I coaches poll. Ivy League power Pennsylvania has been added to a schedule that has already listed the likes of Philadelphia Textile, Fairleigh Dickinson, Rutgers and Princeton.

A blend of veterans and an abundance of youth will dictate the success of the 1981 squad. The following is a run-down on key personnel:

**Line:** Senior Jim Canning, juniors Bill Kirby, Tom Tuffy, and sophomores Joe DiFrancesco and Rich Rousseau offer varsity experience, although some outstanding new faces can be expected to create some waves. Kirby, an ECC Western Section all-star as a sophomore, could also open at midfield, where he is equally as capable. Canning, who with 48 varsity games under his belt is the "senior" member of the team, can be a threat while DiFrancesco, who led the team with four goals a year ago, is one of the swiftest players afoot. Tuffy, a former All-State (NJ) performer and Rousseau, a one-time Mercer County (NJ) leading scorer in high school, have untapped potential. Top newcomers are Burlington County College junior transfer Wayne Heins, and Trenton area freshmen standouts Mike Britton and Mike Simonelli.

**Midfield:** The Broncs may be strengthened if Kirby is able to return to his original position where only senior captain Tony D'Alessandro returns. D'Alessandro, who came back in 1980 after a year's absence due to knee surgery, is an ECC all-star who can also play a fullback post. After those two talents, it's an open field among holdovers Norm Curry, a sophomore, and freshmen Steve Steinmayer and Rob Pontecorvo.

**Backfield:** Declan Burns, who impressed as a freshman, and Peter Kepes, a two-year vet who sat out last year, head the class. One of the team's most interesting newcomers is Burlington County College transfer Warren Heins, who earned third team junior college All-American honors. He is expected to step in immediately with freshmen Kevin Gardner and Bruno Scardelletti heading the freshman class.

**Goaltending:** Junior Lou Wisnowski may be in line to assume fulltime duty after serving his apprenticeship last year as a backup to Ken Yaros. He appeared in seven games and made three starts, including an impressive, 1-0 win over highly-regarded Loyola (MD). Among the newcomers, freshmen Dave Bialas, Steve Drust and Brian Lee rate long looks.

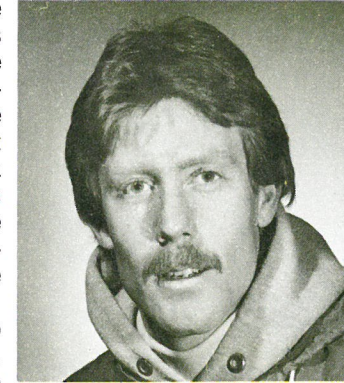

### CROSS COUNTRY OUTLOOK

The Broncs will feature a new wrinkle this fall as Mike Brady takes over the coaching post, thereby becoming the fifth pilot in the sport's 15-year history at Rider. Brady, 27, inherits a healthy program from Len Nardone, who piloted the team for five seasons, including three consecutive winning campaigns.

Twelve harriers who have lettered return in 1981, including seven of the top eight runners from last season's record-shattering 11-2 contingent. The win total represented a Rider high and gave the Broncs a 19-7 mark over the last two years. Among the returnees is junior Tim Anderson, last year's "Trackman of the Year." The Englishtown, NJ native has captured 10 first place finishes in his first two seasons — already a Rider standard. In addition to the home course clocking of 24:53, Anderson has achieved Bronc bests on seven other courses.

Several other veterans will be counted on heavily, however, including a senior nucleus of Dave Melissas, Joe Veres, and Bill Wheatley — all members of the "25" Club, consisting of Rider harriers who have been timed in the 25's. Other key veterans are seniors Greg Mooney, Jim Mitarotondo and junior Jeff Gross.

In addition, senior Jeff Pomeroy is back after a year's absence. Also a member of the "25" Club, he holds the Rider steeplechase record.

Top newcomers to watch include All-State (NJ) performer John McCabe from Hazlet, All-Mercer County (NJ) standout Joe Ewaskiewicz of Trenton, All-Monmouth County (NJ) runner Mark Hastings and All-Middlesex County harrier Joe Longo.

A tough dual-meet schedule, highlighted by the East Coast Conference Championships on Oct. 31 at Bucknell, promises to challenge the Broncs. Rider will also participate in the Glassboro State Invitational, Paul Short Memorial Run (at Lehigh) and the prestigious IC4A Championships at Van Cortland Park (New York City).

Brady, a 1976 Rider graduate, served as interim coach last winter for the college's first varsity indoor track team, which posted a 9-2 record. Also a successful track coach at Hamilton High in Trenton for three years, his highlights included the combined efforts of the 1978-79 and 1979-80 indoor squads, which were 16-1.

Still an outstanding trackster in his own right, Brady is a two-time New Jersey AAU decathlon titlist. In addition to running track at Rider, he was a standout for Bergen Catholic High School (NJ).

The Lawrenceville resident will also pilot the Rider indoor and spring track contingents.

## Fall Sports Guide



### RIDER SOCCER COACH RUSS FAGER

Entering his eighth season at the helm of the Rider booters, Russ Fager has already taken his squads to four East Coast Conference championship games, a feat unequalled on the Rider campus, and only Temple University can also boast such an accomplishment in ECC soccer. Five of Fager's seven teams have reached post season play, either in the ECC or the ECAC.

At age 33, Fager has compiled a 21-11-3 ECC West record, 18-6-1 over the past five seasons. His 56-54-12 overall record against the toughest level of competition in the area places him just 18 victories away from former coach and athletic director Frank Donlon's Rider record of 74 career soccer victories.

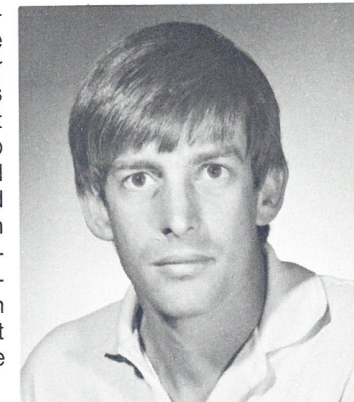
The Broncs have won ten or more soccer games in a season five times since 1933, three of which were under Fager. His 1977 squad established a new standard for wins in a year with a 12-5-1 record, while his 1975 and 1979 teams recorded 10-6-1 and 10-7-2 marks respectively, both times winning ECC West titles.

The former Slippery Rock State standout came to Rider shortly after a three-year collegiate career as a standout midfielder. His junior and senior years, he was a first team selection to the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Athletic Association all-star squad.

Before taking the head coaching position at Rider, Fager served as the assistant coach from 1971 to 1974 under Bob Pivovarnick. In addition to his present coaching duties, Fager is director of the men's intramural program at Rider.

Bob Rostron, a former All-Conference halfback for the Broncs (1968), will assist Fager in the coaching duties for the fourth year. A Trenton resident, the former Steinert High School standout led Rider to a 23-13-3 three-year record under coach Joe Ritter.

Sam Maira will also aid Fager this season, handling the goalkeepers.

### 1982 SOCCER PROSPECTUS

Coach Russ Fager's squad will seek its second consecutive East Coast Conference Western Section title this fall with a pleasant blend of youth and experience. With the exception of 1981 team captain Tony D'Alessandro, who was injured most of last season, and All-Conference fullback Jim Canning, the entire squad that was 4-1 in the ECC West and took Drexel University to three sudden-death overtime periods in the conference championship game, is back this year. The roster is extremely well balanced, consisting of seven seniors, seven juniors, eight sophomores, and nine freshmen.

"With the majority of last season's squad returning and a few 'blue chip' recruits, we should enjoy a very successful season. A lot will depend on our goalkeeping," Coach Fager commented. Last season Rider scored more goals in conference play than any other team in the ECC West (13 in five games), but also let up more goals in the overall season than any other ECC squad (46 in 18 games). The two players determined to cut down the goals against average this season are junior Rob Weisman and senior Lou Wisnowski, who shared the goalkeeping last season. They will be aided in their efforts by the addition of freshman Marty Cassidy, an All-Suburban 1 keeper for William Tennent High School (PA), and junior Tom Mackin, who played backup keeper on the 1979 and 1980 Bronc squads.

The fullbacks will be led by senior captain Peter Kepes, who received honorable mention All-ECC West recognition in '81 despite missing almost half the season due to a hip injury. Senior Steve Fogler and sophomore Kevin Gardiner will supply experience to the defensive corps, which will be manned by sophomore Bruno Scardelletti, who received honorable mention All-ECC West honors as a freshman, and junior Vince Palmere, who was voted the most improved player on the 1981 Rider squad. The fullbacks also possess a trio of talented rookies. Tom Malpezzi, an All-Philadelphia fullback, comes to Rider from Archbishop Ryan High School, where the team he captained finished 22-0-1, winning the Philadelphia Catholic League title. Malpezzi will be joined by soccer and baseball star Ed Whited of Hightstown and honorable mention All-Philadelphia sweeper Kevin McDermott of Archbishop Wood (PA).

At midfield, sophomore Steve Steinmeyer returns after leading the Broncs in assists last season (eight) as a rookie. Speedster Norm Curry, a first team All-ECC West pick last year, hard working junior Declan Burns, and the young and talented sophomore Sal Azzinnari, will be the nucleus of the midfielders, along with freshman Scott MacArthur and Dennis Kirby.

The front line will be led by the co-MVP of the conference for 1981, senior Tom Tuffy. "Tuff" earned second team All-State and All-Region honors and first team All-ECC recognition for leading the Western Section in goals with 14, just two shy of the Rider single season scoring record. The highly competitive Tuffy will be teamed with former All-ECC selection Bill Kirby, sophomore Rob Colton, who also starts on the Rider varsity baseball team, and junior Joe DiFrancesco.

The toughest opponent on the schedule will visit Lawrenceville this season, the Philadelphia College of Textiles and Science, who finished fourth in the country last season among NCAA Division I teams.

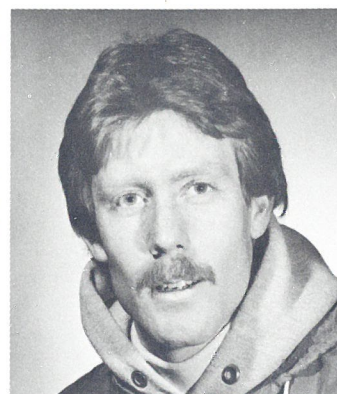

### CROSS COUNTRY OUTLOOK

Coming off the most productive cross-country season in Rider history, second-year head coach Mike Brady feels his 1982 squad will be just as successful. "We lost some key seniors and a standout freshman, but we filled their spots with some very good recruits," Brady stated.

The '82 harriers, who are 32-11 in dual meets over the last three seasons, will have 15 letterwinners returning from the 1981 squad that posted a 13-4 mark, led by senior Tim Anderson. Anderson set the Rider course record for a freshman, set the overall course record as a sophomore, and twice broke that mark as a junior (24:43 for five miles), while achieving Bronc bests on eight other courses throughout his three seasons.

The Broncos possess just three seniors besides Anderson; Jeff Gross, a member of the Bronc "25" club, Tom Mackow, and Greg Mooney. Four talented sophomores will decide quite a few outcomes this season, led by Joe Ewaskawitz, who joined the "25" club with a 25:49 finish in his initial collegiate race. John McCabe, an All-State performer for the Christian Brothers Academy in 1980, sat out last season with mononucleosis, but is expected to produce big things this season along with classmate Joe Longo, who was an All-Middlesex County runner at Sayreville High, and finished the East Coast Conference Championship meet with a 26:49 clocking.

Top newcomers include Eamon Manning (16:13 in Holmdel 5000 and a 26:00 five miles), Bill Lipkus (third team All-State), Larry LeClair (All-Mercer County in first year of competition), and Scott Albright (4:22 mile, 9:45 3000-meter steeplechase).

The schedule is highlighted by the New Jersey State Championships, the prestigious IC4A meet, and the East Coast Conference Championships, in which Rider finished fourth last season in a field of eleven. "Bucknell is always tough, while La Salle, Delaware and possibly Lafayette all show signs of being front-runners this year. I feel we can finish in the top three in the ECC's this season," Brady added.

Brady, a 1976 Rider graduate, has coached the first two Rider indoor track teams to a 21-2 career record. A successful track coach at Hamilton High before assuming the head cross country and track coaching roles at Rider, his 1978-79 and 1979-80 indoor contingents rolled up a combined record of 16-1. An outstanding trackster in his own right, Brady is a two time New Jersey AAU Decathlon titlist, and in July of 1982 he won TAC (The Athletic Conference) New Jersey State Titles in the Pentathlon and the Decathlon.

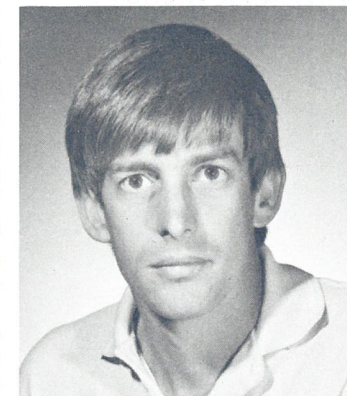

## Men's Fall Sports Guide

## SOCCKER COACH RUSS FAGER

Entering his ninth season at the helm of the Rider booters, Russ Fager has already taken four of his teams to the East Coast Conference Championship game, a feat unequalled on the Rider campus. Five of Fager's eight teams have reached post-season play, either in the ECC or the ECAC.

At age 34, Fager has compiled a 23-13-3 ECC West record, 20-8-1 over the past six years. His 62-63-14 overall record against the toughest level of competition in the area places him just 12 victories away from former coach and athletic director Frank Donlon's Rider record of 74 career soccer victories.

The Broncs have won 10 or more soccer games in a season five times since 1933, three of which were under Fager. His 1977 squad established a new standard for wins in a season with a 12-5-1 record, while his 1975 and 1979 teams recorded 10-6-1 and 10-7-2 marks respectively, both times winning ECC West titles.

The former Slippery Rock State standout came to Rider shortly after a three-year collegiate career as a standout midfielder. His junior and senior years, he was a first team selection to the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Athletic Association All-Star squad.

Before taking the head coaching position at Rider, Fager served as the assistant coach from 1971 to 1974 under Bob Pivovarnick. In addition to his present coaching duties, Fager is director of the men's intramural program at Rider.

Bob Rostron, a former All-Conference halfback for the Broncs in 1968, will assist Fager in the coaching duties for the fifth season. A Trenton resident, the former Steinert High School standout led Rider to a 23-13 three-year record under coach Joe Ritter.

Sam Maira will also aid Fager in the coaching duties again this year, working with the goalkeepers.

## 1983 SOCCER OUTLOOK

With 13 letterwinners returning, Rider coach Russ Fager's 1983 soccer team will seek its fifth East Coast Conference Western Section Title since 1975. After a 4-1 ECC West mark in 1981, the offense (19 goals in 17 games) and the conference record (2-2) slumped in '82.

The 1983 Broncs have plenty of experience despite only five seniors, with 13 players possessing 28 varsity letters.

The squad's strength will be in its midfielders, with two All-ECC first team selections and an honorable mention recipient returning, in tri-captain Norm Curry, Sal Azzinnari and Dennis Kirby. ECC honorable mention (1981) midfielder Bruno Scardelletti will also contribute, along with the hustling Bill Browne.

The offense lost Tom Tuffy (two time All-ECC, All-Region, All-State) to graduation, but will have the talented Scott Mac Arthur returning to take his spot. Mac Arthur was lost early last season to a broken shin suffered during a contest. The speedy Joe DiFrancesco, third in team scoring last year, will see action on the front line, with Jim Hines and Rob Colton, the leading scorer returning from '82 (five goals). Freshman Michael Benson of Toms River could also see some playing time up front.

The fullbacks, along with goalkeeper Rob Weisman, did an admirable job last season, holding the opponents to 27 goals in 17 games. The backs are led by tri-captain Declan Burns, Warren Heins, Steve Steinmayer ('81 assist leader with eight), Vince Palmere ('81 most improved Bronc), and tri-captain Kevin Gardiner at sweeper.

Weisman will return to the nets for a third season, with freshman Kevin Bordner of Cherry Hill West backing him up. Bordner led CHW High to an 18-3 record and Co-Olympic Conference Championship, earning All-Olympic Conference honors.

Other top newcomers include Michael Benson at forward, Mario Cortina at midfield (All-State at Notre Dame), Dean Critchlow at sweeper (Honorable Mention All-Shore at Wall High), Dan Geltrude at midfield, and the speedy Richard Sisson at forward.

Three of Rider's four ECC-West contests are home this year, with six of the nine home contests played at Lawrence Township's Zimmer Field at 7 p.m.

The list of opponents is led by Philadelphia Textile, Princeton, Rutgers and Loyola, with Delaware and Bucknell in the ECC.

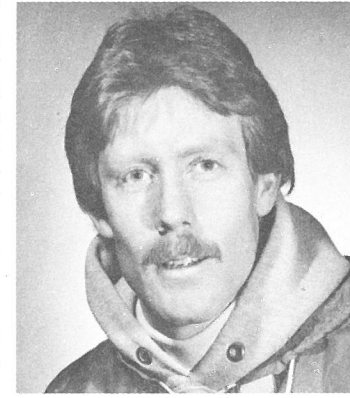

## CROSS COUNTRY OUTLOOK

Bronc cross country coach Mike Brady feels his 1983 squad possesses "far more quality runners than we've ever had," as he enters his third season at the helm of the Rider harriers with a 20-7 career record.

Rider's top performer the last four seasons, Tim Anderson, has graduated, but two sophomores and a pair of juniors who were among the top five runners last season return. That nucleus, made up of Bill Lipkus (25:22 in five miles

at Rider), Eamon Manning (25:03 in five miles at Glassboro State), John McCabe (25:38 at Rider), and Joe Longo (26:06 at Garrett Mountain Park), returns from the 7-3 squad of a year ago. More impressive than the dual meet record is the second place finish in the 10-team East Coast Conference Championships, finishing behind the national power Bucknell University.

"If everyone does the work, we will be dynamite this year," proclaimed an optimistic Brady. "We're young (one senior — Joe Potocki), yet we have a lot of experienced people. The incoming class has quite a few people who are going to be outstanding."

The newcomers are led by Terence Wheat (top athlete at St. Rose High in '82), Chris Koerner (All-State and Toms River High North record holder), Rich Molisso (Morris County Champion for Parsippany High), and Mike La Mantia of Englishtown (St. John Vianney).

### 1984 SOCCER OUTLOOK

With 12 letterwinners returning, coach Russ Fager is optimistic in reaching his goal of a .500 season against the toughest schedule in soccer history at Rider. "I've never had this many talented players in my nine years here," Fager stated, "but when you look at our schedule, reaching .500 is not an easy task." The 16-game slate includes such powers as Philadelphia Textile, Temple, Princeton and Rutgers, along with East Coast Conference foes Hofstra, Drexel, Delaware, Towson State, Lehigh, Bucknell and Lafayette.

Fager feels if he concentrates on keeping the opposition off the scoreboard, the Broncos will make the ECC playoffs for the third time in four years. "We're going to build a defense, and take it from there," stated the Rider mentor.

Kevin Bordner will be the goalkeeper after splitting the chores in the nets last season as a freshman. Bordner compiled 30 saves in nine games while allowing just six goals for a 2-2-1 record, 1½ shutouts, and a goals against average of 0.67 per game. He possessed an .861 save percentage (goals against + saves, divided by saves) which was third highest in the ECC but he did not play enough games to qualify for conference rankings.

In front of Bordner will be veteran fullbacks Steve Steinmayer, Kevin Gardiner, senior Vic Mostrowski (who was injured most of last season) and possibly freshman Chris Tattory of Lawrenceville. "It's going to be tough to keep Tattory from playing a lot," Fager said of one of his top recruits.

The midfield will also be a veteran cast, led by a pair of All-ECC performers, Sal Azzinnari and team captain Dennis Kirby. Also at midfield is the hustling Bill Browne, and sophomores Dan Geltrude and Mario Cortina. The talented but injury-riddled Scott Mac Arthur could drop back from his forward position to midfield this year to take full advantage of his outstanding athletic abilities. "It's much easier on the body to dish out some punishment than it is to take what he has been taking at forward," Fager explained.

The front line will be led by sophomore Mike Benson, who led Rider in scoring as a rookie with five goals and one assist for 11 points. His wings will be Genaro Gencarelli, Alberto Gaglanese, and the speedy John Antonucci. "Antonucci is our fastest player and is very strong and aggressive," Fager commented. "He can really make things happen out there."

In the East Coast Conference this year, Rider will play in the Eastern Division for the first time, with Drexel, Hofstra and Towson State. The Western Division will be composed of Delaware, Bucknell, Lehigh and Lafayette. Only games within the division count in regular season conference standings, with the division winners playing the runner-up of the other division in the championship playoffs.

Of Rider's eight home games, two will be played on Saturday afternoons on campus. The other six will be night games at Lawrence Township Park, located about a half mile south of Rider.

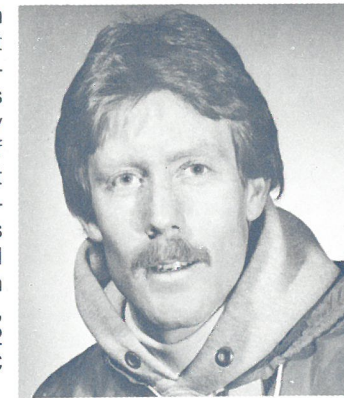

## CROSS COUNTRY OUTLOOK

Following a fourth place finish in the East Coast Conference Cross-Country Championships last year, Mike Brady couldn't help but think of the old sports adage, "Wait 'till next year." The three-year Rider coach knew his squad (10-4) possessed more young talent than any Rider team before it, even more than the '82 squad which was the ECC Championship runner-up.

The year Rider cross-country fans have been waiting for could be here, if the top runner is healthy, or as coach Brady stated, "if he's not with us then it looks like we'll be 'one year away' again."

The '84 Broncs return 15 letterwinners, including the top seven of a year ago, but Rider's top harrier, junior Bill Lipkus, underwent arthroscopic surgery on his knee in June and it is not known whether he will be able to compete this fall or not.

Lipkus compiled two first place finishes, two second places and a third in the New Jersey State Championships. He also had an eighth place finish at the ECC Championships last year, finishing first among Rider runners in seven of the eight meets.

In the eighth meet, the ECC Championships, teammate Terence Wheat broke the habit of finishing runner-up to Lipkus and finished fourth among the conference's best harriers, just one second off the previous Lafayette College course record of 25:00. Wheat enjoyed a fine track season as well in his rookie year (ECC Champ in the two-mile).

"Along with Wheat and Lipkus, Chris Mortello and transfer Charles Valan are also members of the 24:00 club (having completed a five mile race under 25:00)," coach Brady said. "Scott Allbright, Rich Molisso, Chris Koerner, John Gaudio and Mike LaMantia will also be depended on to have big years for us this season. If we're 100 percent and everyone does what they can do, then we're looking to take the ECC title away from Bucknell." The Bucknell Bisons have won the ECCs the last eight years.

The young Broncs possess just two seniors and four juniors on their 24 man roster. "We're still a young team, but we've got some quality runners with experience in big meets," Brady stated. "Even if we aren't 100 percent this year, don't count us out."

Coach Brady, a 1976 Rider graduate, also coaches the indoor track team and the spring track and field teams at Rider. An outstanding trackster in his own right, Brady was a two-time New Jersey AAU Decathlon titlist and, in July of 1982, he won the New Jersey TAC Decathlon and Pentathlon crowns.

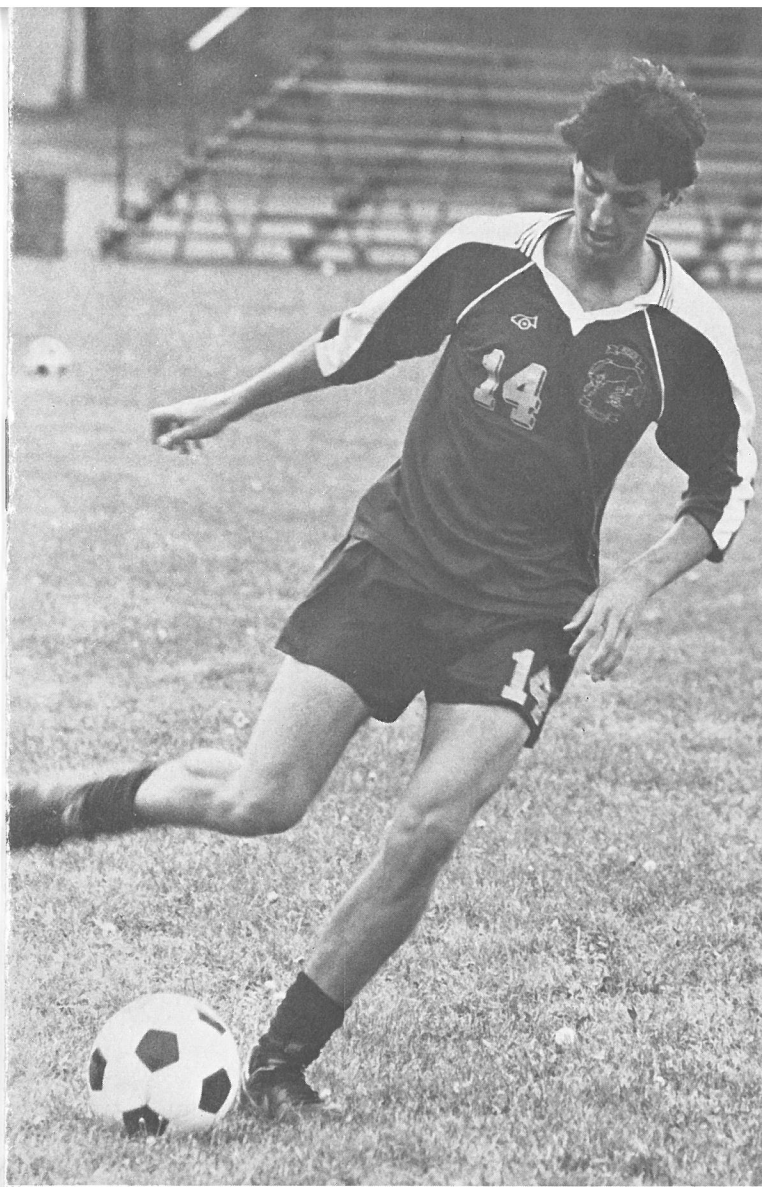

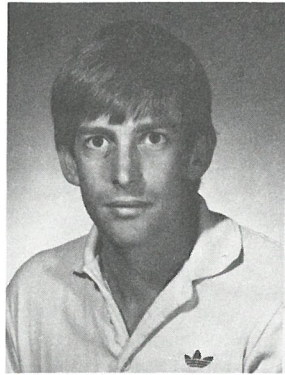

## HEAD COACH RUSS FAGER

Entering his twelfth season at the helm of the Rider booters, Russ Fager has taken four of his teams to the ECC Championships. Six of his eleven teams have reached post-season play, either in the ECC or the ECAC.



Fager compiled a 25-14-4 record against the ECC West, 22-9-2 over the final seven years. At age 37, his seventy-two career victories place him just three wins away from breaking former coach and athletic director Frank Donlon's Rider record of seventy-four career soccer victories. The Broncs have won ten or more games in a season five times since 1933, three of which were under Fager. His 1977 squad established a Rider standard for wins in a season with a 12-5-1 record, while his 1975 and 1979 teams recorded 10-6-1 and 10-7-2 marks respectively, both times winning ECC West titles.

The former Slippery Rock State College student (class of '71) came to Rider shortly after a three-year collegiate career as an all-star midfielder. His junior and senior years, he was a first team selection to the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Athletic Association all-star team.

Before taking the head coaching position at Rider, Fager served as assistant coach from 1971-74 under Bob Pivovarnick. In addition to his coaching duties, Fager is director of the men's intramural program at Rider.

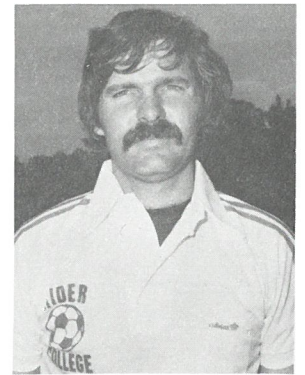

## ASSISTANT COACH BOB ROSTRON

Bob Rostron, a former All-Conference striker for the 1968 Rider Broncs, will assist Fager in the coaching duties for the eighth year. A Trenton resident, the former Steinert High School star led Rider to a 23-13 three-year record under coach Joe Ritter in the late sixties. As a sophomore, Rostron led the Broncs to a 10-3-1 record with thirteen goals. He was the Rider captain his junior and senior years, again leading Rider to a 10-3-1 record his senior year. After graduation (class of '70), Rostron played for the Trenton Extension semi-pro soccer club, which reached the national championships in 1976. He concluded his semi-pro career, playing for the Trenton Italians club, in 1983.



### Outlook

The Rider soccer team will have a new look this season, with almost half of the roster made up of new players. "Man for man, this group has the potential to be a winner and a competitive force in the ECC, depending on how quickly the newcomers can contribute to help the team jell," states head coach Russ Fager, who enters his twelfth season at Rider.

"Our goal is to get back on track in ECC play, to get back into the conference playoffs. It might take more than one season, but we're definitely heading toward that goal," Fager says. The Broncs offense has struggled in recent years, scoring just twenty-five goals in the last thirty-two games. "We have fourteen new faces this year, and half of them are forwards," adds Fager. "Last year we did not play a bad game, we just didn't score. We were playing as well as the opponent on just about every occasion. We lost three games by one goal, tied three others, and six went into overtime. We just didn't put the ball into the net."

The people Fager looks for to put the ball in the net this season are returning lettermen Mike Benson and Marc Perry, along with key newcomers Anselmo Bryan, Jerry Bryson, Lance Simek, Rick Telfian, and Rohan McFarlane. Benson led the Broncs in scoring his first two seasons and was the third leading scorer for Rider last year. Perry saw limited action as a rookie, but looks to regain the form

that earned him All-State honors for Abington Friends High School as the league's Most Valuable Player. Bryan showed great skills in the New Jersey Cup games, playing for the Monmouth Sting. Bryson comes to Rider from Mercer County Community College, where he accumulated great experience and a strong work ethic. Simek is "primarily a striker, but has the tools to play almost anywhere," notes Fager. Telfian was the second highest scorer in the state of New York last year, and was named to the United States Soccer Coaches Association second team. His seventy-six career goals is a Suburban Council league record. McFarlane, who originally hails from Jamaica, was a three-time All-State selection at Columbia High, along with being a track standout.

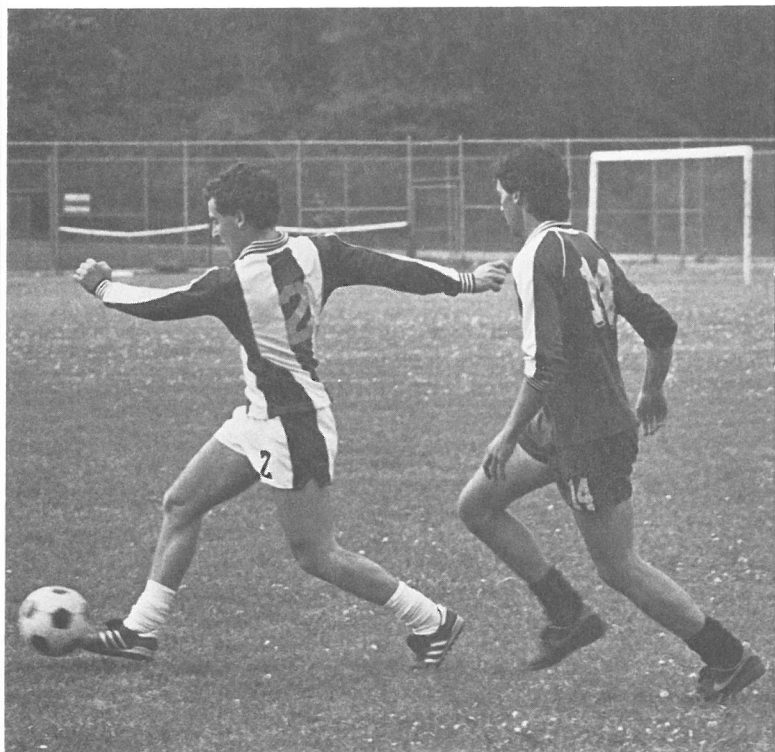
The solid defense, led by veterans Jim Gillen, Dan Geltrude, Kevin Nerwinski, and Chris Tattory, will be bolstered by the addition of Mark Adams and Joe Otto. Adams, a two-time All-American (first team NJCAA in '85) at Mercer County Community College, will play midfielder or back this year. "He's an outstanding player who will probably be the biggest addition we have this year," Fager states. Otto was the South Jersey Defensive Player of the Year for Holy Cross. "Otto is big, strong, aggressive, and fast. The potential is certainly there," adds Fager. The Rider nets will be tended by veteran goalkeeper Kevin Bordner, a three-year starter who played every game last season. He will be backed up by the talented Tom Hofmann, a former starter at Mercer, and newcomer Terence Bogie, "an excellent athlete with good size."



At midfield, Rider loses its premier player of the 1980s in Dennis Kirby, but returns John Tattory and Mike O'Brien. The key newcomers here are Joe DiMeglio, Ludovic Cuadrado, Robbie Walsh, and Iver Hughes. DiMeglio comes from the excellent Steinert High School program, where he "was, without question, one of the top players in Mercer County last year." An excellent athlete, DiMeglio holds the Steinert decathlon record. "I'm not sure where he'll play, but it'll be tough to keep him off the pitch," Fager exclaims. Cuadrado has a strong soccer background. His father, Christian, played professionally in France and now coaches the Monmouth Sting, which won the Jersey Cup. Walsh shows a great deal of skill and ability, while Hughes, a native of England, worked with Rider in the spring and showed Fager "a great deal of skill."

The schedule features sixteen opponents, led by nationally ranked Rutgers and ECC-foes Drexel and Lafayette. All seven conference games are in October, with just two, Delaware and Towson State, to be played at Rider.

"Last year, a lot of the players who we felt had potential did not pan out," Fager admits. "This year, there is a very good chance that *all* of the key recruits *will* pan out, and, if that happens, I think we'll be in good shape."

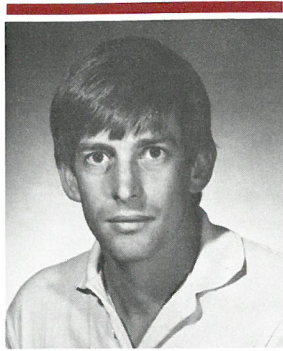
## Head Coach Russ Fager

Entering his thirteenth season at the helm of the Rider booters, Russ Fager is the all-time winningest soccer coach at Rider, with 76 career victories. Fager, who has taken four of his teams to the East Coast Conference Championship Game, passed former coach and athletic director Frank Donlon's record of 74 career wins last season. Six of Fager's twelve teams have reached post-season play, either in the ECC or the ECAC.

Fager compiled a 25-14-4 record against the old ECC West, 22-9-2 over the final seven years of the East-West alignment. Since 1933, five Rider soccer teams have won 10 or more games in a season, three of which were under Fager. His 1977 squad established a Rider standard for wins with a 12-5-1 record, while his 1975 and 1979 teams recorded 10-6-1 and 10-7-2 marks respectively, both times winning ECC West titles.

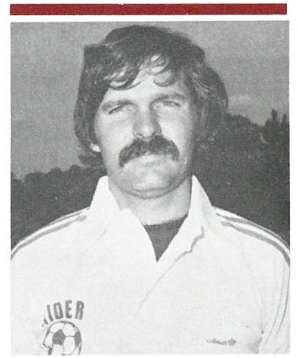
The former Slippery Rock State College standout (class of '71) came to Rider shortly after a three-year collegiate career as an all-star mid-fielder. His junior and senior years, he was a first team selection to the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Athletic Association all-star team.

Before taking the head coaching position at Rider, Fager served as assistant coach from 1971-74 under Bob Pivovarnick. In addition to his coaching duties, Fager is director of the men's intramural program at Rider.



## Assistant Coach Bob Rostron

Bob Rostron, a former East Coast Conference All-Star performer for the 1968 Rider Broncs, will assist Fager in the coaching duties for the ninth year. A Trenton resident, the former Steinert High School star led Rider to a 23-13 three-year record under coach Joe Ritter in the late sixties. As a sophomore, Rostron led the Broncs to a 10-3-1 record, scoring 13 goals. He was the Rider captain his junior and senior years, and again led Rider to a 10-3-1 record his senior year. After graduation, (class of '70), Rostron played soccer for the Trenton Extension semi-pro club, which reached the national championships in 1976. He concluded his playing career with the Trenton Italians club in 1983.



## Outlook

With the return of 16 letterwinners and the addition of a handful of key newcomers, the 1987 Rider soccer team should be an enjoyable one to watch, using a new style of play that will make for exciting contests. "We hope to score three or more times a game, even if we have to give up two or three goals to do it," stated 12-year head coach Russ Fager. "We have so many potential goal scorers and good attacking backs with the ability to push the ball up the pitch quickly, that we have changed to a wide-open style. We have enough skillful and intelligent players who know how to use their skills to the fullest," Fager added.

Last season the young Broncs jumped out to a 4-1 record, 1-0 in the ECC, before the top offensive players (senior Mike Benson and freshman Rick Telfian) and key defensive performer (junior Mark Adams) came down with injuries. Rider scored three goals over the next seven games as a result. Fager employed the "wide-open" style then and the squad tied Princeton 3-3, but fell to Rutgers in the season finale to finish 4-8-2. "With the depth we now have, injuries like the ones we suffered last year will not be as devastating," Fager stated. "We've never had this much depth at one time," he added.

The top returnees include five seniors and six sophomores who saw the majority of playing time last season. Mark Adams, Chris Tattory, and Kevin Nerwinski anchor the defense in front of keeper Tom Hofmann, while John Tattory leads the midfielders. Adams was a junior

college All-American at Mercer County College in '85, and Nerwinski played for Old Dominion before transferring to Rider and reuniting with his former Notre Dame High School State Champion teammates, the Tattorys. John transferred from Rutgers for a change in academic majors, and Chris is the only four-year starter on the squad. Hofmann came to Rider from Mercer, and possessed a goals-against average of 0.81 and a save percentage of .840 in 13 games for the Broncs last year.

The super-sophs include the leading scorer from last season, Rick Telfian, fleet-footed forwards Anselmo Bryan, Rohan McFarlane and Lance Simek, midfielder Robbie Walsh, and back Ivor Hughes. "That group played a large role last season, and with the year's experience behind them, they'll be even more valuable," Fager said.

The newcomers are led by a pair of junior college All-Americans who are former Irish Youth National Team members, forward Gary Byrne and back Paul Gillard of Dublin, Ireland. At Mercer County Community College, the duo led their squad to a 42-0-5 two-year record, with Byrne collecting 48 goals. "He will be one of the top offensive players in the ECC this year, probably the entire East Region," stated Fager. "Gillard is a strong, take charge player on defense, who should complement Adams and Nerwinski very nicely," Fager added.

The schedule is once again one of the toughest in the area, beginning with nationally ranked (Division II) Hartford and Massachusetts at the second annual Kenney, Webber & Lowell Insurance/Soccer Classic at Hartford. "St. Francis (NY), Rutgers and Lafayette have all been nationally ranked recently, and Brooklyn College is



coached by Len Bellows, the U.S. National Assistant Coach. Drexel, Lehigh, and Towson State are all going to be very tough in the conference, so our schedule is certainly a challenge," Fager stated. "If we get by the first five games or so with a positive attitude, we'll be a tough team to stop. Our primary goal is to make the ECC playoffs, then win the conference, and with our schedule, if we have enough wins, to get an NCAA bid."

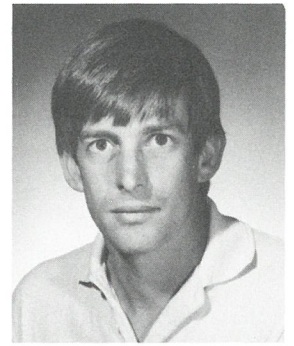

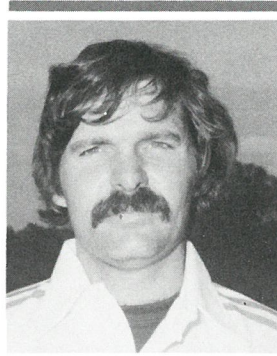

A Trenton resident, the former Steinert High School star led Rider to a 23-13 three-year record under coach Joe Ritter in the late sixties. As a sophomore, Rostron led the Broncos to a 10-3-1 record, scoring 13 goals. He was the Rider captain his junior and senior years, and again led Rider to a 10-3-1 record his senior year. After graduation, (class of '70), Rostron played soccer for the Trenton Extension semi-pro club, which reached the national championships in 1976. He concluded his playing career with the Trenton Italians club in 1983.



## Outlook

With the return of 13 varsity letterwinners, including 7 starters from the 1987 East Coast Conference runner-up squad, and the addition of "what may be the best incoming class on paper that we've ever had," the 1988 Rider soccer team looks to have a second consecutive banner year.

"Last year was a great time, the first fun season we've had in four or five years," stated thirteen-year head coach Russ Fager, the 1987 ECC Coach of the Year. "Everyone worked hard to get things done," Fager said. The '87 Broncos (12-7-1) tied the Rider record for wins in a season, lost five games by one goal, and tied 18th-ranked Brooklyn College on the road despite having to play the final 64 minutes a man short. "This year our offense is the same, but we'll have a whole new defense. I see that as our only concern, finding the right people to keep the ball out of the net," Fager added.

The net itself will be the least of Coach Fager's worries, with a handful of quality keepers fighting for returning starter Tom Hofmann's job. Hofmann, the 1987 ECC Scholar Athlete for soccer, was a senior academically last year but has a year of eligibility remaining. This year he is taking extra undergraduate courses while tending the Rider nets. Hofmann won all 12 games last season, and entered the playoffs as the ECC's top keeper (0.94 goals against average and a save percentage of .861). "This is by far the best group of keepers we've ever put together," stated Fager. Leading the new keeper corps are Robert Walker, Rocco Maruca, Mike Kedersha, and Joe Di-Donizio, while Perry Doyle returns after serving as Hofmann's back up last year. "Walker is the ideal size (6'1", 180 lbs.) with good hands. He is intelligent and aggressive. He can do it all," Fager said. "Maruca is a Tom Hofman-type very intelligent and coachable," Fager added.

The list of returnees is led by the offensive front line, forward, senior Gary Byrne, and junior Rick Telfian and Anselmo Bryan. These three combined for over half of Rider's goals and points last year, and look to score even more this year. "We have to have those three healthy and scoring goals this year for us to be successful again," Fager stated.

The midfield will be led by Lance Simek, who totaled 11 points last year and "has a calming effect on the field. Lance is very skillful in transition, bringing the ball from defense to attack," according to Fager. Also at midfield is senior Mike Ciesielka, who played almost every minute of every game last year.

The defense was strong and experienced last year, but much of that experience graduated. Gone are John and Chris Tattory, Mark Adams, and Kevin Nerwinski. "They will be hard to replace," Fager said. "They were very deter-



mined, goal-oriented people with desire and motivation that you don't find every day. They possessed many intangible parts of the game that make up a winner," Fager added. Returning on the defense are Paul Gillard and Ivor Hughes. Gillard was a junior college All-American before coming to Rider last season, while Hughes "was probably our best defender last year," according to Fager.

The newcomers are led by the keepers, along with "seven or eight people who could come right in and contribute," in Fager's eyes. Dave Parsha is a 6'1" midfielder from the fine soccer program at Abington High, and one of the first Rider athletes to be a Presidential Scholarship winner for outstanding academics. "He is big, strong, and skillful, along with being an excellent student. What more could you ask?," Fager said.

Mike Hoff, an All-State forward last season, played for the Medford Strikers and was a big reason for their success. "Every game I saw him play, he scored a goal. Mike

will be a solid addition to our forward strength," stated Fager. Paul Muller is a fine athlete who played baseball and golf at Council Rock High and will use his great speed as a Bronc midfielder or forward. On defense, Michael Adams, Brandon Borschel, Phil Susi, Rob Hofmann, David Carmignani and Mark Haywood head the list of rookies, "All six of them have the potential to come in and replace what we lost to graduation," Fager added.

The schedule is once again a tough one, with Rutgers, Howard, St. Francis (NY), and Villanova as the top non-league opponents. In the ECC, "Lafayette is always the favorite, while Bucknell, Drexel and Lehigh are going to be tough," Fager added. "We have a very good schedule, so reaching .500 would be a success. We have a lot of depth, so injuries should not play a big role in how we do. Our first priority is, as always, to make the ECC playoffs. After that, everything else is gravy," Fager said.

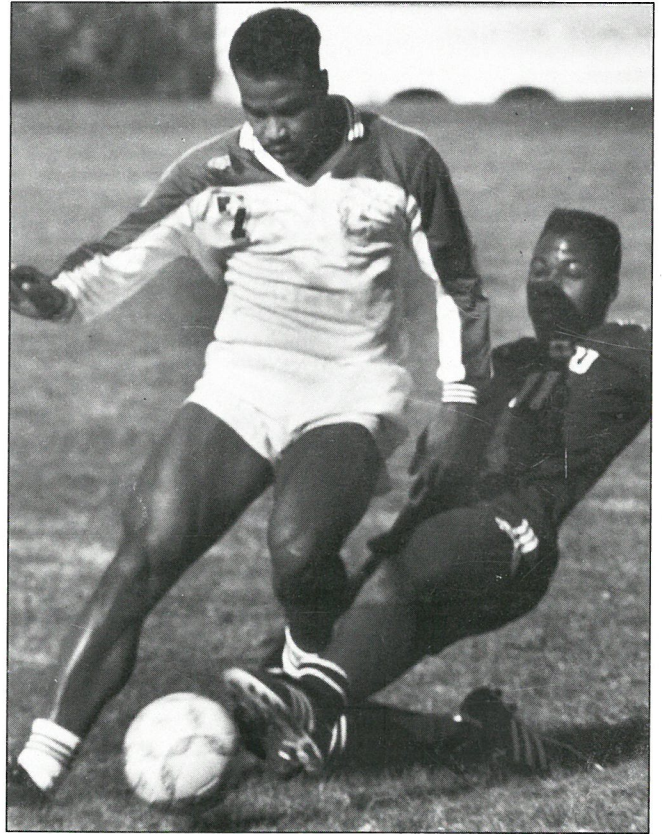

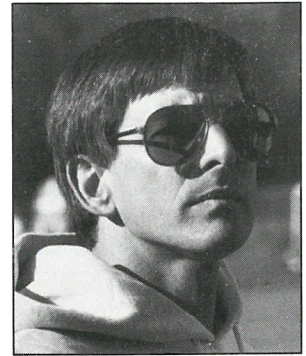
## HEAD COACH RUSS FAGER

Entering his fifteenth season at the helm of the Rider booters, Russ Fager is the all-time winningest soccer coach at Rider, with 95 career victories. Fager has taken five of his teams to the East Coast Conference Championship game, and in 1987 was named the ECC Coach of the Year. Eight of Fager's 14 teams have reached post-season play, either in the ECC or the ECAC.

Fager compiled a 25-14-4 record against the old ECC West, 22-9-2 over the final seven years of the East-West alignment. Since 1933, six Rider soccer teams have won 10 or more games in a season, four of which were under Fager. His 1977 squad established a Rider standard for wins with a 12-5-1 record, and that mark was tied when his 1987 squad finished 12-7-1. His 1975 and 1979 teams recorded 10-6-1 and 10-7-2 marks respectively, both times winning ECC West titles.

The former Slippery Rock State College standout (class of '71) came to Rider shortly after a three-year collegiate career as an all-star midfielder. In his junior and senior years he was a first team selection to the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Athletic Association All-Star team.

Before taking the head coaching position at Rider, Fager served as assistant coach from 1971-74 under Bob Pivovarnick. In addition to his coaching duties, Fager is director of the men's intramural program at Rider.

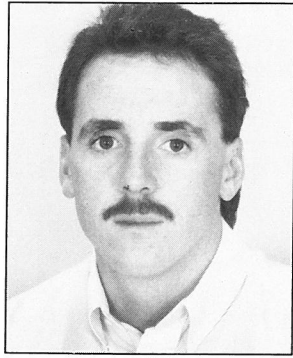

The Broncs will have a new assistant coach this season in Tim Lenahan, who replaces 10-year assistant Bob Rostron. Lenahan comes to Rider from Stockton State College, where he served as both the assistant men's coach for five years and the head women's soccer coach in 1988. A native of Pine Hill, New Jersey, Lenahan was a three-year standout soccer player at Stockton State, earning All-NJAC honors as a sweeper his senior year.

"Tim comes to us with a lot of enthusiasm and drive," stated Russ Fager. "His youthful attitude coupled with his coaching and playing experience will make him invaluable to our program. I can see his role as being a motivator, while helping to expand our fund-raising and resource areas. He has a national advanced coaching license from NSCAA, so he knows what he's talking about. He's a good man," Fager added.

Prior to coaching at Stockton State, Lenahan served as an assistant soccer coach at Burlington Community College. Tim is currently obtaining his master's degree in human services at Rider.

OUTLOOK**

The 1989 Rider soccer team will have a new look. The pre-season roster possesses over 30 players, with only 12 having earned varsity letters and half of the letterwinners are sophomores. "We are very young, but only by age, not experience," stated 14-year Rider head coach Russ Fager, who guided his last two squads to the East Coast Conference playoffs. "This year we have 10 recruits who have played on State Select teams or an All-Star team of that level," Fager added. "We have the potential to be as good as the '87 squad (advanced to the ECC Title game), and we should be better than last year," Fager said.

Gone from last year's 7-8-2 squad that placed fourth in the ECC are goalkeeper Tom Hofmann, the ECC scholar athlete, former junior college All-Americans Gary Byrne and Paul Gillard, two-year starters Mike Ciesielka and Derek Spencer, and Marc Perry, who earned ECC athlete of the week honors last year.

The Broncs return a cornerstone of four seniors: captain Lance Simek at midfield; leading scorer Anselmo Bryan; midfielder Jamey Cranstoun; and All-ECC back Ivor Hughes. "Simek is our best technical player who deals very well under pressure. He'll be the quarterback this year," Fager stated. "Bryan has great skills and must score goals regularly for us to be successful. Cranstoun is probably our most improved player over the last two years, while Ivor is our best defensive player. He is skillful, fast, and is obviously very strong, but his biggest asset is his will to be successful," Fager added.

Other key returnees are sophomores Dave Parsha, Mike Adams, and Phil Susi, junior Rick Telfian, senior Greg Carr, and red-shirt freshmen goalkeepers Chip Maruca and Rob Walker. Parsha was the top rookie last year and the first Rider booter to be a Presidential Scholarship Winner for outstanding academics. "David showed us even more in the spring," Fager stated. "Adams and Susi saw a considerable amount of action last year, so they have more experience than your typical sophomores," Fager explained.

Telfian was the Rider leading scorer as a rookie in '86, and the third leading scorer in '87, before taking a year off last year for medical reasons. As a senior at Niskayuna High, he was the second leading scorer in New York State with 38 goals and 12 assists. "Rick has matured a lot and his great ability to score goals can only help us," Fager said. Carr came on late last year after a series of injuries and illnesses to become a starter.

The goalkeeping job is still up for grabs. "I feel very secure in either Rob or Chip as our keeper this year," Fager said. "Whichever one wins the position will be the starter. Rob is big and aggressive, while Chip is a great instructor of the defense," Fager said.



Key newcomers are Charlie Sebelles, Marc McQuate, Lance Reich, Mike Stasiulaitis, Ray Valentin, Anthony Vigorito, and Andy Caruso. Sebelles was an All-Conference, All-Area, and All-County selection for Morristown High. Reich was an All-Philadelphia Catholic League selection at Bishop Egan High and played in the Keystone State Games.

Valentin hails from Puerto Rico, where he collected 10 shutouts his senior year. Vigorito is a Garden State Distinguished Scholar and was a three-year starter on the Steinert Group III State Championship team. Caruso was a member of the PA State Team after helping Upper Dublin High win the Suburban 1 Championship.

The '89 schedule begins with the American University Soccer Classic in Washington, D.C. "The tournament will give us an opportunity to play two talented teams, then take a week off to work on what we discover in those two games," Fager explained.

Nine of the 16 scheduled contests are on the road, but five of the all-important seven ECC games are home. Rutgers, George Washington and future ECC-member Central Connecticut head the list of non-conference opponents, while defending champion Drexel and Lafayette are the perennial ECC powers.

"We have three goals for this season," Fager stated. "One, to finish over .500. Two, to make the ECC playoffs again and three, to be successful in our home games. If we win all of our home games, we are almost assured of obtaining the first two goals as well," Fager added.
